The Pandemic Effect on how the Parish Council does Business

- Under the legal framework before the Coronavirus Bill, Councillors could only attend face to face meetings in order to be eligible to vote. The Coronavirus Bill allowed us to meet virtually.
- We held our first Zoom meeting just after the Coronavirus Bill received Royal
 Assent to accept and activate our High Consequence Infectious Disease Policy.
- The requirement to hold an annual meeting in May was disapplied and we that the existing chairman and vice chairman would remain in office until May 2021.
- We agreed to review the need for a meeting on a monthly basis and decided to use Zoom if held one.
- From June 2020 we went back to meeting monthly just via Zoom.
- That continued until May 2021. The Coronavirus Bill ended on 7th May and we could no longer meet virtually. We met in June in Collinson Park and went back to face to face in August.



Initial Impacts

- We had to close the Fish Pond until 13th May and technically Collinson Park was closed although that was more difficult to enforce despite police support.
- We postponed Barton Live to October 4th (in line with the London Marathon as they were on the same day in April) and eventually altogether.
- The Flood Review Open Meeting was cancelled although we kept supporting all those impacted.



Barton Volunteer Network



- Lots of people wanted to help mitigate the effects of Lockdown on one another
- Once we started to understand what lockdown would mean we pulled together the Barton Volunteer Network or BVN to give an umbrella to the 150+ volunteers who stepped forward to support their neighbours, an absolutely stunning community effort.
- The first calls were taken on March 22nd and Councillors Sharkey and Jones x 2 manned the phone for 4 months meaning help was only ever a phone call away.
- Prescription collections of 10 to 15 prescriptions at a time. Also food shopping, calls like "I have no milk or bread- is there any chance someone can fetch some because I can't get out and I've run out of food". Morrisons stepped up to deliver medication to the village and as lock down went on got a phone line so people could phone up, order food talking to a real person, then deliver.
- We were delighted when the Barton Neighbourhood Volunteers decided to form a charity and carry on the good works (and more) started by BVN. BNV is still taking calls about meds, but only about 6 or 7 a week. Transport is provided for hospital appointments. The call and chat line is still really busy and there's a core of people who need ongoing help and support. JTHS are making gift bags for some of the people through the year as was done last year. They are now actively involved with the Places of Welcome.


Supporting the NHS and Key Workers
