I am told (I would think up the 1930s) girls at school always remembered to wear an oak leaf otherwise boys with handfuls of stinging nettles would chase them (according to my mother in law and known as Oak and Nettle day in some parts of the country!).

This tells us dates are important for all sorts of reasons and we all have special days and other remembrances. Celebrating them with other people is always good.

One thing we have thought about more in Lockdown is to support others, especially those who have been alone.

Now we do not need to support in the same way.....but everyone needs a way to broaden out again, with care in different things. We have just thought of special occasions, should we now share them in a wider way, perhaps with those we supported in the Lockdown.
